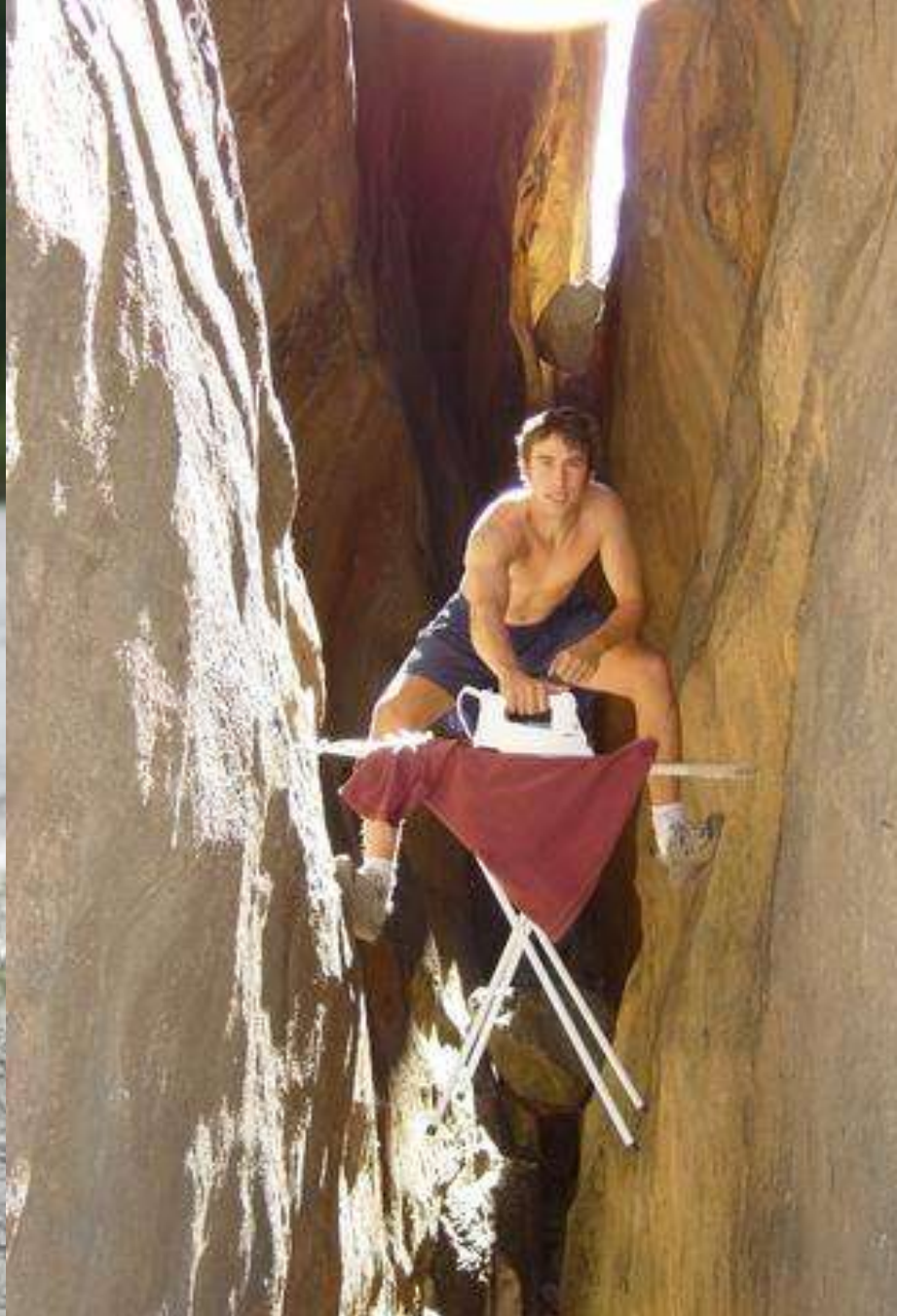

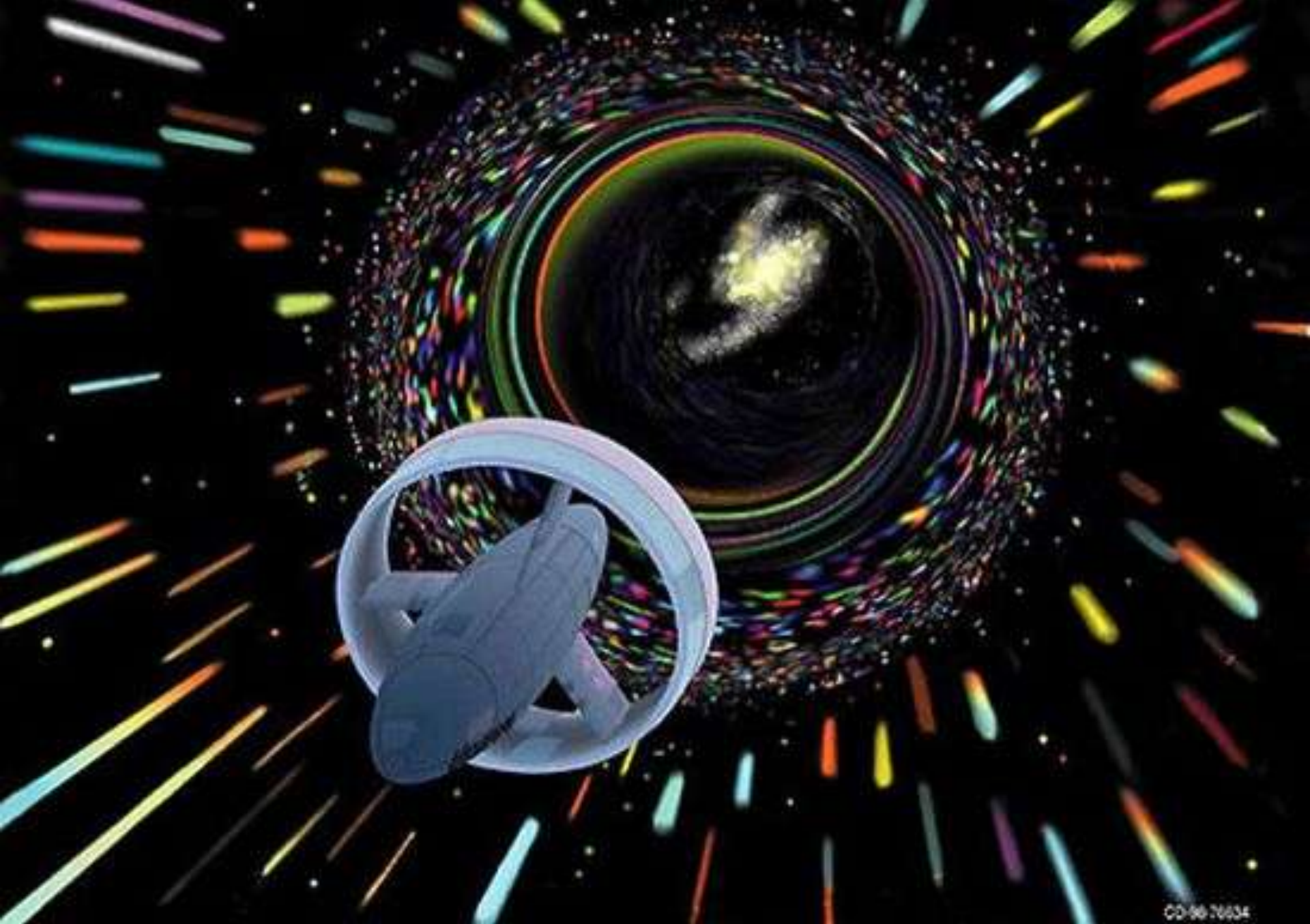

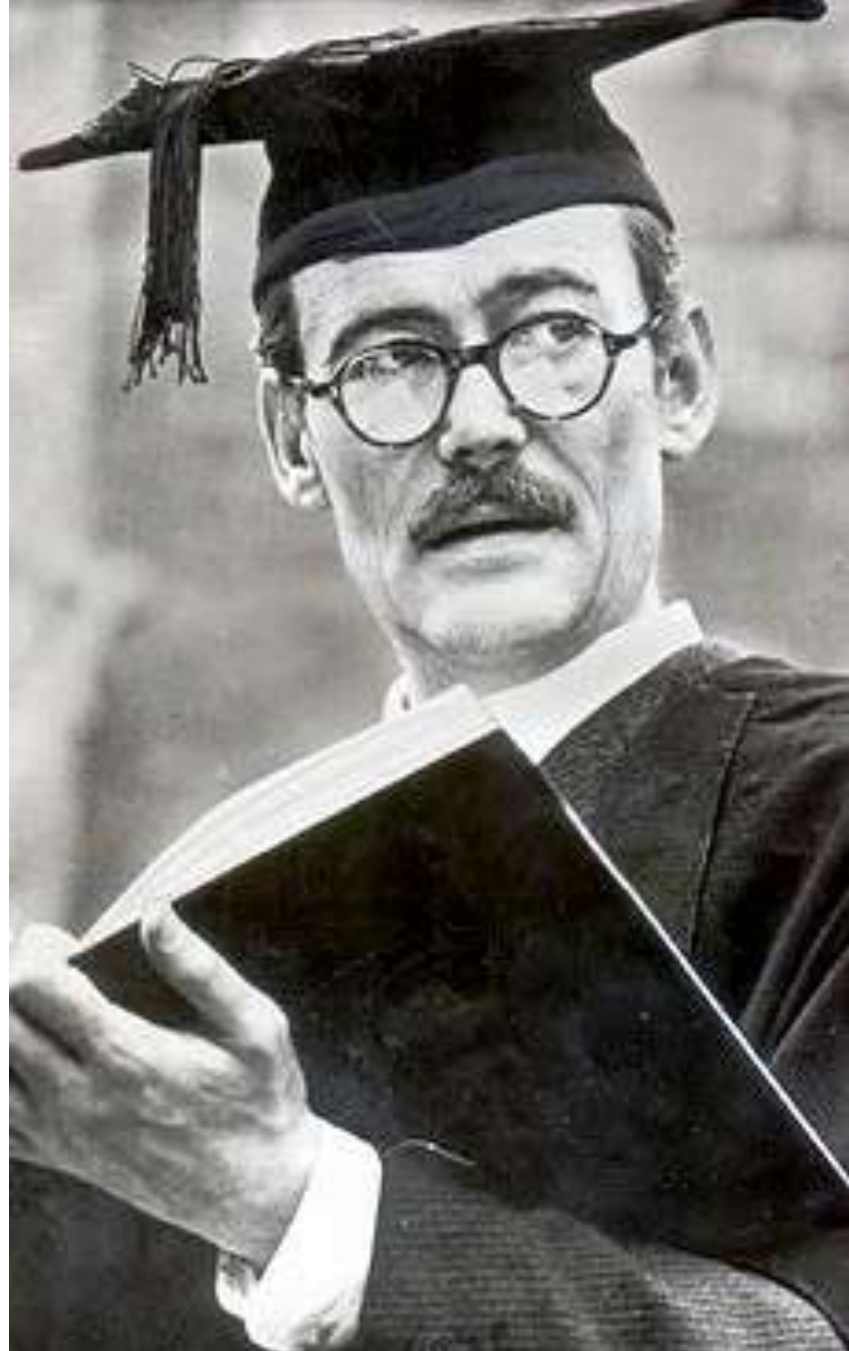

Grammar as it was...



‘The passive is often used when we describe processes. It tends to be more formal than the active, or it’s used when we are unaware of the agent (or if it’s obvious.) To make the passive, place the object in the first position, then follow it with the verb *‘to be’* (taking care to ensure you have the correct tense) then the past participle. If we know the agent, we can put this at the end, preceded with *‘by’* – for example *‘The best biscuits are made by the English.’*
